

D.C. Morgan commended for the third time

ARRESTED

The men were arrested and later admitted they intended committing a robbery. They were all convicted and each was sentenced to four years imprisonment.

After the trial at the Old Bailey the Judge commended the officers for their astuteness in realising there was something wrong with the car and its occupants and for taking immediate and firm action.

When he left Bell's Grammar School, Coleford, in 1955, D.C. Morgan became an apprentice engineer with Lister's in Cinderford until he joined the Metropolitan Police Cadet Force in July, 1958.

The following year he became a uniformed constable at West Hampstead in North West London for four years before being attached as an aid to the C.I.D. In February, 1965, he was appointed a detective constable and is at present stationed at Golders Green.

D.C. Morgan has been commended twice previously, for rescuing three people from a car which caught fire in an accident and for restoring to life a man suffering from coal gas poisoning.
